May Meeting

I was cutting the grass this morning, hoping that I'd have it short enough so I could apply fertilizer with weed killer after the rain that's predicted. I've had long wet grass clog the spreader, and thus waste a day, the rain, and time. Then I realized, that aside from using the Internet to try and second guess the weather, technology sure hasn't impacted my yard chores very much. I can't plug in more memory, or upgrade to a faster processor.

I mentioned that "WeatherBug" appeared on my computer system after one of the many XP updates I've loaded onto my system, while other user group members reported not having seen this program. It burrows in and starts on boot up, insisting on dialing up to get the latest temperature, humidity, wind speed and direction, and a host of other weather statistics. It gets

current real-time information from various sources close to your location - you provide your zip code. There are 25 locations within 10 miles of my house, mostly schools, but including Dulles Airport and the US Geologic Service that can be selected to feed data into the WeatherBug application.

Lots of other weather information is available, including forecasts, weather maps, camera views, and radar information. When you're on-line, Weatherbug gives a chirp and lets you know when the National Weather Service issues an alert for your area. Give it a try - there's a mode that allows you to select advertisers that run in a banner of the Weatherbug console. Those banners will nag at times about updating to the paid version, but it's not that annoying, and I've used the ad-sponsored service for months. (<http://weatherbug.com/aws/index.asp>)

On April 14, Lindows Inc, the publisher of the LindowsOS Linux distribution, announced a name and logo change after a prolonged court battle with Microsoft over the Lindows trademark in the US and losing judgements to Microsoft in Europe. The product and support web sites and LindowsOS product line are adopting the new name, Linspire. However, remaining stock of product may still be distributed under the Lindows name. Then, there was the \$187 in free merchandise I was able to select as part of the Anniversary Sale. That provided a Belkin Wireless Router / 4 port switch, and a wireless LAN card.

My other big weakness is restaurant discount coupons.

LG CD-ROM Drive Updates Available

LG CD-ROM drive firmware updates are available from LG support and Dell to fix the issue reported in the November Cursor article. Instructions on how to fix and restore operation of the affected drives can be found at <http://www.mandrakelinux.com/en/lgerrata.php3>. The LG flaw only affected certain models of CD-ROM drives (not DVD drives) that did not follow the ATAPI specification, and was triggered by installation of Mandrake Linux 9.2 and similar GNU/Linux distributions (e.g. SystemRescueCD prior to version 0.2.6).

Red Hat Drops Official Support

As of April 30, 2004, Red Hat, Inc will no longer provide official errata and maintenance support for consumer versions of Red Hat Linux (up to and including Red Hat 9). Red Hat users

should consider switching to the community supported Fedora Core 1 GNU/Linux distribution or purchasing Red Hat Enterprise Linux. Red Hat provides help in selecting the appropriate migration path at <http://www.redhat.com/solutions/business/migration/>.

Ardour - v0.9beta11.2. Free GNU General Public License source code and packages for Red Hat, Debian and Fedora Core 1. Ardour is a digital audio workstation. You can use it to record, edit and mix multi-track audio. Produce your own CD's. Mix video soundtracks. Experiment with new ideas about music and sound. Generate sound installations for 12 speaker gallery shows. Have Fun. Ardour capabilities include multichannel recording, non-linear, non-destructive region based editing with unlimited undo/redo, full automation support, a mixer whose capabilities rival high end hardware consoles, lots of plugins to warp, shift and shape your music, and controllable from hardware control surfaces at the same time as it syncs to timecode. If you've been looking for a tool similar to ProTools, Nuendo, Cubase SX or Sequoia, you might have found it. Because Ardour uses JACK to handle the

hardware interface, it supports a wide range of low-end to high-end audio hardware.

Ktouch - v1.3. Free GNU General Public License source (ktouch is also included in the kdedu packages with most distributions). KTouch is a program for learning how to touch-type. KTouch offers you an easy way to learn to type on a keyboard quickly and correctly. Every finger has its place on the keyboard with associated keys to press. Starting with only a few keys to remember you will advance through the levels of the training lecture while more and more keys are introduced. KTouch shows the keys you need to press and the finger you need to use for that key on the screen. KTouch requires QT 3.2 and KDE 3.2.1 libraries.

Train Director - v1.19. Free source code for GNU/Linux and Microsoft Windows 95 and packages for Mandrake and Red Hat Linux. Can you keep the trains running on time? Train Director is a clone of the popular Train Dispatcher simulation software. With



Train Director you can simulate the work of the Centralized

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Traffic Control by controlling the movement of trains by throwing switches and clearing signals. You can also create your own territories with the included track layout editor. Many contributed track layouts from Italy, Portugal and Russia are included.

FreeS/WAN - v2.06. Free GNU General Public License source code and packages for Red Hat and Fedora Core 1. Linux FreeS/WAN is an implementation of IPSEC &

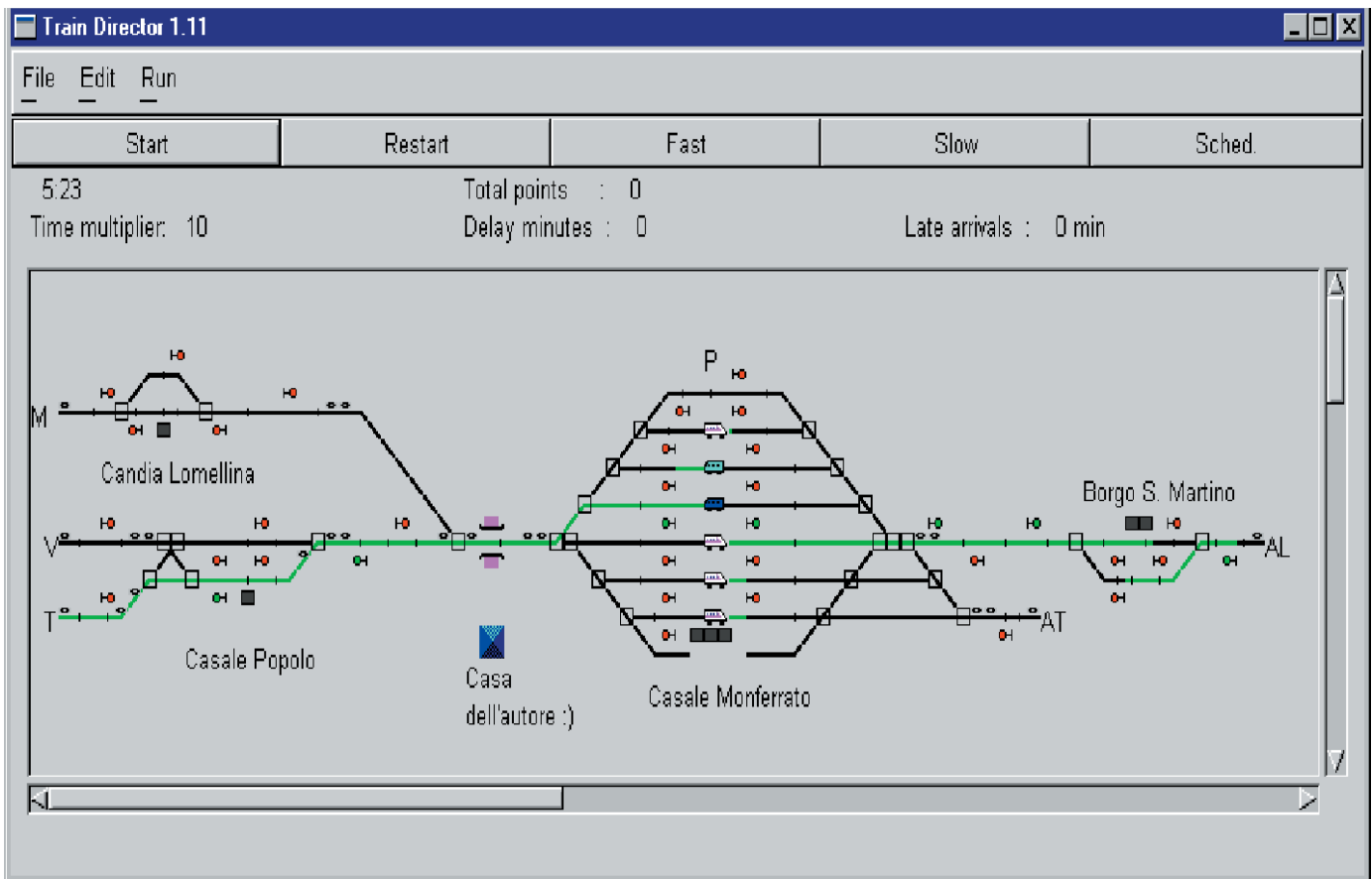
IKE for Linux. IPSEC is Internet Protocol SECURITY. It uses strong cryptography to provide both authentication and encryption services. Authentication ensures that packets are from the right sender and have not been altered in transit. Encryption prevents unauthorised reading of packet contents. These services allow you to build secure tunnels through untrusted networks. Everything passing through the untrusted net is encrypted by the IPSEC gateway machine and decrypted by the gateway at the

other end. The result is Virtual Private Network or VPN. This is a network which is effectively private even though it includes machines at several different sites connected by the insecure Internet. This is the final full release of FreeS/WAN.

Kernel Source - The latest versions of 2.4 and 2.6 kernel source code for all platforms.

WAC Website is now “mirrored”

During the month of April, the organization that hosts our web site performed major surgery to update their facilities and servers. The update was supposed to take place over a weekend to minimize the amount of time our web site would be unavailable. However, if you attended last month’s meeting, you saw the level of frustration shared by the entire board of directors.

The good news is that we are pleased to report that we have

a new organization hosting our web site. In addition, the previous hosting organization is continuing to host the site. What? How can that be?...

Our old web site was hosted by APCUG which is the organization to which we belong as a computer user group. There are lots of benefits APCUG provides to their member user groups — one of which is hosting our web site at no cost to WAC. However, based on our experience last month, the WAC Board of Directors elected to have another hosting company host our web

site for a small fee.

The only real issue is that the sites cannot have the exact same URL. That being the case, the hosting company is using our publicized URL of <http://www.wacug.org/>. APCUG also hosts the exact same web site information at <http://wacug.apcug.org/>. Note that the second hosting does **NOT** contain “www” in the URL.

So if you happen to find our usual URL (<http://www.wacug.org/>) not working, then try using our “mirrored” site at <http://wacug.apcug.org/>.

Whither the Yellow Box?

Eastman Kodak Company, an icon in the photographic industry for more than 100 years, dropped a bombshell last September when it announced that the company would shift its focus from film and film-based products to *digital* equipment and processes! And it has resolutely continued down that path. In January 2004 the company announced that by the end of this year it would no longer be selling re-loadable film based 35mm cameras, including APS models, in the U.S., Canada, and Western Europe. The “throw away” (i.e., one-time use) cameras will be the only Kodak film camera available in the west. The number of different films provided to retailers will be reduced, concentrating on just the most popular lines. Production of its Carousel film projectors

was scheduled to cease the end of 2003.

Kodak said that it plans to continue providing 35mm cameras in emerging markets, such as China, India, Eastern Europe and Latin America, and will introduce six new film cameras in those markets this year. It predicts rapidly growing markets for cameras and film in those countries, in contrast to what is being seen in the west where the demand for film-related products is shrinking much more rapidly than anticipated, while purchases of digital cameras continue to grow dramatically. Kodak’s array of digital cameras now extends from point and shoot consumer models to high-end professional (read very expensive) digital cameras and camera backs. It will increase its production of inkjet printing papers, and plans to introduce a new line of consumer ink jet printer models to go head-to-head with the

well-established offerings from HP, Epson, Lexmark, etc.

Kodak’s landmark shift in focus represents a profound change for the world’s largest filmmaker, and a huge gamble. The success of the move remains uncertain. Just when Kodak needs increasing film revenues to underwrite the costs (in the billions) of this transition, film sales are dropping substantially. Since 1997 Kodak has reduced its workforce by more than 30,000 jobs. Another 15,000 jobs will be eliminated in the next two years in a further effort to reduce costs. Success is not a given. If fortune does not smile on Kodak, then not only may the Yellow Box disappear, but the company itself may go down the same path—and it won’t be a Yellow Brick Road!

To listen to the whole song you must buy the song for 99 cents.

You can buy as many songs as you want through the Apple Music store. You will have to enter your credit card with Apple music store in order to download music from iTunes.

You can burn songs onto an unlimited number of CDs for your personal use. You can listen to your songs on an unlimited number of iPods. (I will talk about iPods in a minute.) You can play your songs on up to three Macintosh computers or Windows PCs.

You can also set up an account for your children. Kids now have a legal way to download their favorite songs with music allowance accounts. You set up the account using your credit card and then set up a monthly allotment of how many songs your kids can buy. Once they reach the monthly limit (and they will reach that monthly limit), they cannot download any more songs.

Another nice new feature from iTunes is you can now purchase audio books. At the time of this writing, Harry Potter books were not available from iTunes.

Napster

Napster is a monthly service that you pay \$9.95 a month for downloading songs. You can download as many songs as you want to your computer. However, if you want to burn the songs to a CD or digital device such as

the Dell Music Jukebox then you must pay 99 cents a song.

Real Networks and Music Match also use the Napster model. I like having the ability to download as many songs as I like (or how many songs my hard drive will handle) without having to pay 99 cents a song.

If you want to burn the songs to a CD or a portable digital device then the Apple model may be more to your liking.

Problems

iTunes will only burn to CDs and Apple's own iPod. The iPod is a 15 GB device that sells for \$299.00 and will carry almost 7,000 songs. Let me see, 7,000 times 99 cents equals about \$7,000.00. This is a very good moneymaker for Apple.

The Dell Digital Jukebox Music Player is very similar to the Apple iPod and costs \$249.00. The math is the same, about \$7,000.00 for 7,000 songs.

The problem is that iPod and Dell do not play nice with each other. If you use iTunes, then you are going to want to buy the iPod. If you use Real Network, Music Match or Napster then you are going to want to use the Dell Digital Jukebox Music Player.

The biggest problem is that not all famous artists are available for download with one of the online service providers. Therefore, you may only be able to listen to a favorite artist of yours on iTunes and another favorite artist of yours may only be available on Napster.

Once again, the consumer is on the short end of the stick with all of the big boys wanting to use their own standards. They are telling us, it is their ball, and you are going to play the game by their rules. We have danced to this song before!

Conclusion

Who will win the music wars? Let us do some calculations.

I remember being able to buy KISS records on sale at Music Land for \$3.99. Let us do some math. Twelve songs on a typical album divided into \$3.99 equals 33 cents. Today we pay 99 cents for a song or \$9.95 for the whole album.

However, that is far better than the \$18.99 suggested retail price of CDs that are currently on sale in stores. Let me see, \$18.99 divided by 12 equals \$1.58 a song. Ouch! I do not know who will win the music wars, but I do know who has lost. The music store retailers and the consumers have lost. I am against illegal file sharing, but I am also against record companies suing 12-year-old girls.

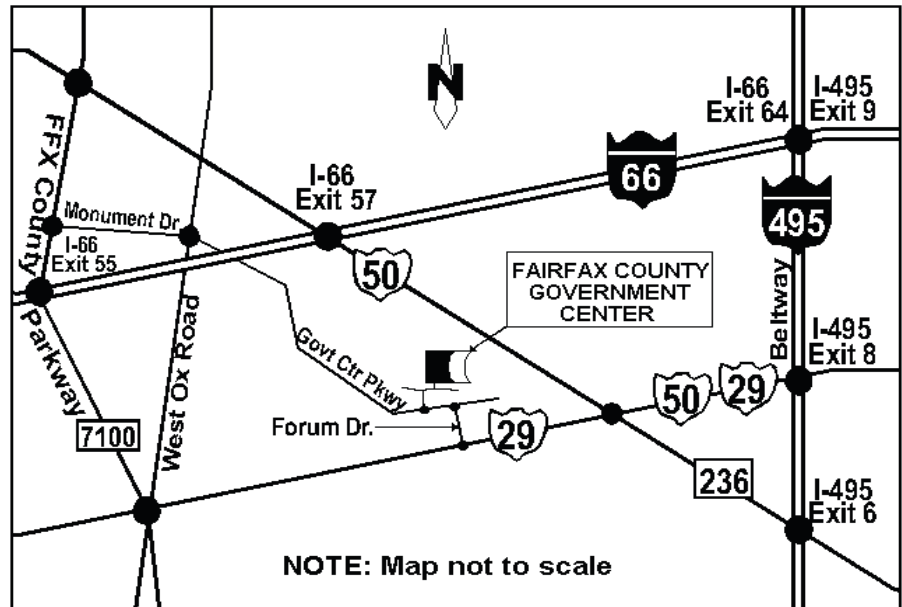
